Epistle

Romans 6:18-23;8:28-39

Tothers and Sisters, you, having been set Ifree from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified.

What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, "For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be

We will miss you greatly.


Why do we use incense?

Incense has been used in the worship of God for countless generations starting from the earliest times. In scripture Cain and Able were invited to offer their gifts to God.

Noah by offering his gifts who's smoke rose to God as a pleasing fragrance, convinced the Lord never to destroy the earth again. In Jerusalem's temple, the holiest place where God Himself dwelt, there was a constant burning of incense, with multiple services dedicated to the burning of it for the salvation of the

people. God has made his presence known in smoke and fire through

history. To this day, we burn incense at various church services to bless, cleanse, humble, awe, and move the people into holiness. In the bible you can find the word incense 116 times, and burnt offerings nearly 300 times. To burn something as an offering to God, where effort and sacrifice has been given in providing the gift, has been central to the Judeo-Christian tradition since the begging, and is particularly evident in our Eastern Christian liturgical tradition today.



Smells also have a great way of bringing a person into a particular state of mind. Certain smells attract, others repulse, some excite while others calm. Humans and animals have used scents to communicate for hundreds of thousands of years. Think of how dogs and cats rub up against their owners to both leave their scent and to gain their owner's scent. Aroma therapy has a huge influence on millions of people around the world, reducing anxiety and giving energy. Churches also recognize that scents can be powerful tools to transport people into prayer. When we enter into a space that smells of incense, we consciously or subconsciously are moved into a mental place conducive to prayer.

Is incense good for everyone? Well... we recognize that some people are more sensitive to certain smells than

others. Some people also have breathing problems like asthma which are stressed by things like smoke. Therefore as a parish we have done several things to allow for a better environment for these people. Firstly, we use good incense that is hypo-allergenic. Cheep incense does indeed negatively affect us all not only those with sensitive lungs and

noses. Secondly we use incense sparingly (not huge spoon full onto hot coals, but rather one little rock at a time). Thirdly we have one Liturgy each day which does not use incense at all. Those who have respiratory issues are encouraged to take advantage of this. (There is no incense used at the 5pm Sunday Liturgy.)

I recognize that smells and smoke affect some people seriously, and it is no laughing matter, however I also have done an experiment several times that... makes me laugh. Due to requests from several people, I have sometimes not lit the charcoal, nor have I put anything into the kadylo (aka the therable, sensor), but I have swung the kadylo as usual for the sake of the visual and audio effect. It is funny, and simultaneously sad, how many people start coughing, sputtering, complaining and even leave the building when I do this.

Should we remove incense from our worship because some have difficulty with it. Probably not. Incense does much spiritual good for the church and is pleasing to God (as we understand in scripture). But we can work with people so that their needs are taken care of, reducing or eliminating the negatives while increasing the positives gained.

We may ask you (your organization/ministry) to move your stuff to a particular area to keep things orderly. (For example: Sunday School stuff should be together in the Class Rooms, Knights stuff in the Knight's storage area, Choir stuff in the choir loft, etc...)

PASTORAL CARE

Being present to people is nice. Recognizing the presence of Christ in people and serving them in the times of their need is profoundly moving.

Our Pastoral Care Director is inviting all parishioners to join us in serving those in need, especially those in hospitals, nursing homes and shut ins. In the fall we will have a Pastoral Care Training course which will help us to know what to say, what to do, and what perhaps not to do when spending time with others.

Also we are looking to have some good reliable, faith filled volunteers to help us distribute

Eucharist to those who are unable to come to the Church. We will have a Pastoral Eucharistic Training Session on Saturday June 25th at 10 am, where we will help our volunteers understand about the Eucharist, and to know how to distribute Him (yes, HIM not it).

All those interested in volunteering with Pastoral Care, either as Volunteer Visitors, or as Pastoral Eucharistic Ministers are invited to apply by contacting Marilyn Comchi at <marilyncomchi@shaw.ca>

Please note: any and all males and females are most welcome to apply. The pastors will then discern with the applicant if they are a suitable candidate to visit people and/or distribute Eucharist. All volunteers will be asked for a Police Information Check with Vulnerable Sector in accord with our Safer Environments policy.

If you know of anyone who is in a hospital, a nursing home or senior's lodge, or who is shut in at home, please also let us know about them by contacting Marilyn at the above address. To the parents of our young children may we suggest...

Relax! God put the wiggle in children; don't feel you have to suppress it in God's house. But do prevent them from kicking people in the pews.

Sit towards the front where it is easier to see and hear.

Quietly explain the parts of the Liturgy to your children.

Sing the hymns, pray and voice the responses. Children learn liturgical behaviours by copying you.

If you need to leave Liturgy with your child, please feel free to do so, but please come back. You can also take advantage of the "cry room".

Remember that the way we welcome children in church directly affects the way they respond to Church, to God and to Christ. Let them know that they are at home in this sacred space.

We love pew art! Please use the blank papers and colouring sheets provided in the "cry room" (not pew envelopes) for your child to draw us some beautiful art. We can hang them on our parish bulletin boards for all to enjoy.

Do your best to attend Liturgy on time.

In fact we'd love it if you would come up to the priests before service and give them a "high five". When kids know the priest they feel more comfortable.

At St. Stephen Protomartyr, ALL PEOPLE ARE WELCOME who wish to live a Christian and Catholic way of life, regardless of their ethnic, economic, history or any other backgrounds. We are part of God's Holy Church, here to joyfully lead the life taught by the Risen Christ, reaching out with love and proclaiming His word to all people for the glory of God.

Faith Formation Possibilities

We all need to understand our faith. In particular, as a parish we need good people who can lead and help with various programs and ministries; people who are trained to do their job and who understand their faith.

Therefore as a parish we are willing to help with or even cover the tuition for those who are willing to share their talents with the rest of the community.

Newman Theological College (NTC) is a Catholic College in Edmonton that offers Certificate Courses in house but also online. There are several different courses for those who wish to teach catechism, prepare people to receive sacraments (Marriage, Baptism, etc.), work with youth, evangelize, work with the poor, visit the dying and more. (see www.newman.edu for more details) Classes that would help us all are also available through Metropolitan Andriy Sheptytsky Institute (MASI) in Ottawa (see www.sheptytskyinstitute.ca for more details), and periodic

workshops offered by our own Eparchy.

The Certificates in Eastern Christian Traditions offered by NTC are something I would dearly like to promote. It would be ideal for all parishioners, not just those who wish to work within the parish.

I (Fr. Bo) propose that we have an "in church" group class in the upcoming academic year, where we study together and then share after class. Some people can take the classes for credit, and others can audit the program. If you can't come and study with us as a group, you can also study from home.

If you are willing to multiply your talents by studying and perhaps working within the church, please talk to Fr. Bo. He would dearly love to hear from you.

Here are more details about this program:

The Certificates in Eastern Christian Traditions includes six courses each, of approximately 25 hours over a five-week period. Each course requires that you complete readings and assignments, and participate in online discussions.


