
Epistle (Romans 13:11-14:4)

The Service of Forgiveness

(The Solemn Beginning of the Great and Holy Fast)

Normally this service would be celebrated at Vespers on Sunday night for Clean Monday. However in most parishes the best time to celebrate this is following the Divine Liturgy on Chesefare Sunday.

PRAYER OF ST. EPHREM

Priest and people pray this Lenten prayer together.

O Lord and Master of my life, keep from me the spirit of indifference and discouragement, lust of power and idle chatter. (Prostration)

Instead, grant to me, Your servant, the spirit of wholeness of being humble mindedness, patience and love.

(Prostration)

O Lord and King, grant me the grace to be aware of my sins and not to judge my brother; for You are blessed now and ever and forever. Amen. (Prostration)

Priest: On bended knee, let us pray to the Lord.

People: Lord, have mercy.

Priest: O Lord, Jesus Christ, our God and hope of all on land and of those far away at sea, you have established these holy days of fasting by Your law and the prophets, as a way for our mortification and repentance. At the proper time, You manifested Yourself in the flesh on this earth, and by Your fast of forty days and nights, You sanctified the practice of fasting and commanded us to follow Your example. As a merciful and gracious God, enable us to begin these holy days of the Great Fast with perfect repentance, with humility instead of hypocrisy, with fervent prayer, with hunger and thirst, with frequent prostrations, and with a contrite heart. Enable us also to complete this time of the Great Fast without fault and with a pure conscience, keeping our faith intact and achieving victory over sin. Send us an angel of peace to watch over our lives, to protect us from all snares of our enemies, and to assist us in the performance of good deeds. Strengthen us by Your power so that we may accomplish the spiritual works of the Great Fast. Then, with our passions in control and our souls and bodies properly cleansed, we will be worthy to partake, without condemnation, of Your most pure Body and Your most precious and life giving Blood. For You are the merciful and gracious Lover of Mankind Who come down to earth to save all; and we give glory to You and Your Eternal Father and Your all holy gracious, and life giving Spirit, now and ever, and forever.


Then, before the assembled Body of Christ, the priest begs from the Faithful their forgiveness, saying:

Priest: Holy brothers and sisters, forgive me, the sinner, and pray for me.

People: God forgives. May the Lord forgive you, Father, and have mercy on you. Also forgive us Father, and pray for us!

Priest: God forgives! May He have mercy on us and forgive us all.

If time allows: The people come forward and embrace the priest and receive the anointing with oil. The people then approach one another and mutually seek forgiveness.



Forgiveness Sunday

Also known as Cheesefare Sunday



Today let us stand at the threshold of the Holy Great Fast, ready to enter with faith and joy. We also sit at the threshold of paradise with Adam and lament what we have lost. Today we again hear our story: the story of our creation at the hands of God; the story of life that is breathed into us by the very breath of God. This is our dignity; this is our nobility; this is why we are to respect life. For life is a gift from God.

Now Satan enters the scene and sets his snare. He tricks Adam and Eve into disobedience by promising them far greater things than what they already have. He promises them equality with God!

But this is a trick! This is the insidious part of the whole scheme! They already share a deep communion with God; however, by following Satan's deceitful design to gain some- thing even greater,

they lose what they already have. This is the deceptive guise of sin. It promises us something that seems so beneficial; but when we say yes to it, suddenly it tears off its mask and reveals its ugly face to us. Then in a moment, we know in the depths of our being that we have been duped. We have been tricked! We all know the queasy feeling in the pit of our stomach when we face this realization.



Then together with Adam, we sit and lament. We too by our sin have given up our God-woven robes; we have lost the delights of Paradise. We too now live not in communion but in brokenness.

The final elements necessary for repentance are presented today: fasting and forgiveness. We seek to regain our communion with God, and Christ is our Way. We come to join the New Adam and undo what we have done with the Old Adam. Adam failed to fast from the tree and thus lost Paradise; we therefore fast in order to regain it. But even more than fasting, even more than almsgiving and prayer, the Gospels give us another way to enter into communion with God. This is through forgiveness. As our holy father Saint John Chysostom says: "Nothing makes us so like God as being ready to forgive the wicked and wrong-doers." Only when we have crossed this threshold are we ready to enter the Fast in proper spirit

and seek forgiveness from our heavenly Father.

Wait a minute! I thought Lent starts on Ash Wednesday. And what about getting ashes on my forehead?



If you are Ukrainian Catholic (or a member of any other Byzantine Catholic church such as Melkite, Greek,

Ruthinian, etc...) the season of the Great Fast (commonly called Lent) begins at sunset on the evening of Forgiveness Sunday (which is technically the beginning of Forgiveness Monday, since liturgically and biblically the day starts at sunset). If you are Roman (Latin) Catholic then your season of Lent starts on "Ash Wednesday", two days after the Byzantines have begun.

The reason for the different start dates is how we count to 40 days, from what do we count 40 days. We Byzantines count 40 days before Holy Week, which begins on Lazarus Saturday (the day before Palm Sunday, which is one week before Pascha (Easter)). Latin Catholics count 40 days, not including Sundays, before the Easter Triduum.

We Eastern Catholics begin the Great Fast by reaching out to each other asking for forgiveness. Western Catholics begin by putting ashes (the burnt remains of last year's palm branches from Palm Sunday) on their foreheads.

The day before the Great Fast starts, Byzantines call "Cheese-Fare", because (if you are following the strict rules for fasting) it is the last day to eat dairy products, oils, and other non-fasting foods. Similarly the week before when we were about to stop eating meat we had "Meat-Fare" Sunday. Roman Catholics have a similar day to use up non fasting foods called "Shrove Tuesday" often times people associate this day with pancakes, because this is a good way to use up eggs before the fasting season.

How am I supposed to observe the Great Fast?

The season of the Great Fast, is not merely about abstaining from certain foods. It is first and foremost an opportunity to grow in holiness. The Church encourages us to do this by praying more, helping others more, by approaching for the sacrament of Confession (and then Eucharist), and yes by fasting and abstaining from certain things also.

As far as fasting goes, there are several different sets of standards that are put forward. The Ukrainian Byzantine Catholic Church has a set of "minimum" rules, which it expects all the faithful to uphold. (Failure to do this minimum is considered laziness, which is a sin.) This means that at VERY LEAST we are all expected to refrain from animal products (both meat & dairy) on the first day of the Fast, and on Good Friday, and to abstain from meat on all Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays during the whole fast. (Yes, recently our Synod added Mondays to the list.) As your pastor, I hope that we can all do better than this.

The traditional fast is considerably more strict. It basically says that as of sunset on Meat-fare Sunday, we stop eating meat until Easter Sunday. Dairy, eggs, oil, fish, wine (alcohol) and of course sweets are eliminated from one's diet starting at sunset on Cheese-fare Sunday. Only one meal is permitted a day except on Saturdays and Sundays. (The really strict fasting rules suggests a total fast during the entire first week for those who are strong enough to do so.) On Saturdays and Sundays wine and oil are permitted. Fish is only permitted on Palm Sunday and on the feast of Annunciation (March 25). Holy Week is even stricter than

the preceding weeks. As your pastor, I know that for most of us, this is not reasonable.

Frankly, I suggest that we all first and foremost focus on praying more, helping others more, and making at very least one good confession. If your schedule allows for it, please attend the Presanctified Liturgies and the Parish Lenten Mission. You

should also consider making scripture reading part of your daily prayers. What to read will vary for each person. If you do not read the scriptures at this time, start by reading through at least one Gospel over the course of the 40 days. If you already read scripture daily, consider adding some more, perhaps from the Old Testament. Other spiritual reading may be a good thing for you to add to your prayer time too. Talk to

me if you want me to suggest a book or two for you.

As for fasting... do at least the minimum rule, but also make sure you eat more healthy foods including vegetables, and cutting out fatty foods, sweets and alcohol. Eat and drink in moderation. Do not eat until you are full, but rather eat a reasonable amount so that you will not be hungry. Consider eating at home more, and save the money that you would spend eating out for the poor. Also fast from swearing, gossiping, and wasting time watching the TV or playing on a computer. Remember fasting is not just about food.

Whatever you choose to do, make it reasonable. If you set your goals too high, you will likely fail and get frustrated. Fasting is supposed to help us become more disciplined and to take our focus away from food to Christ. It is not meant to frustrate us, and make us worried about "rules".




Did you know that the elderly, children, those with special medical conditions, traveling or doing hard physical labour are not expected to fast? If you are in doubt about fasting, ask your spiritual director or your parish priest.

The Liturgies of the Presanctified Gifts Wednesdays and Fridays at 7pm

The Divine Liturgy being the banquet of Christ is a festive, joyous, and triumphant celebration. The ancient discipline of the Byzantine Rite did not permit such celebration during the season of Great Fast, this being the time of penance and mourning for sin.

The Church, knowing that Christ is our greatest strength and support during our earthly pilgrimage, allows us to celebrate a communion service on certain days of the Great Fast. This service, called the Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts is not a true Divine Liturgy because it contains no consecration of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ. The holy communion that we receive at a Liturgy of Presanctified Gifts is the species of consecrated bread only. Unconsecrated wine is added for reasons of taste and facility in swallowing the holy communion.

This special service, a combination of Vespers and a communion ritual, is traditionally celebrated on Wednesdays and Fridays of the first six weeks of Great Fast, and on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of Holy Week. Its authorship is sometimes attributed to St. Gregory Dialogus who prior to becoming Pope of Rome served in Constantinople as a papal envoy. It is more probable that St. Gregory merely recorded this ancient Liturgy from the oral tradition and on his return to Rome introduced it to the western Church.





The Sacrament of Reconciliation

During Lent, and especially during the Lenten Mission, we have a great opportunity to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation.

Please find, use and keep a free little trifold pamphlet in the atrium (Narthex) of the church with:

- An explanation of what the Sacrament is about
- An examination of Conscience to help you prepare for the Sacrament
- The normal order (how to) of doing the Sacrament

Priests are available during the Mission on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday starting at 6pm, as well as normally at 10 am most Sundays, 4pm most Saturdays, and by appointment. It is perfectly fine to go to any Catholic priest to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

Services During Lent

and the "Soroko-ooste" service

There are 5 Saturdays throughout the winter and spring where we commemorate all those who have passed. The first one is the Saturday before Meatfare Sunday (a week ago), the 2nd, 3rd and 4th fall on the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Saturdays of Lent, and the 5th and final one falls on the Saturday before Pentecost. This year because the feast of Annunciation happens to fall on the 5th Saturday, we only get to commemorate them 4 times, not 5.

On these days we say a prayer for all the deceased we can. Our parish has a book which includes all the names of our loved ones ever submitted to us by all of our parishioners. If you would like to add to the list of names please see the ladies in the office during office hours. They would be happy to help you.

All the names in the book are read out during the Liturgy and prayers for the deceased.

Lenten Activity Suggestions:

- Reading 5 minutes of Scripture every day (or increasing the amount you read by 5 minutes if you already do).
- Quit smoking and/or drinking.
- Go for a 10 minute prayerful walk every morning
- Visit some elderly people in a nursing home, or sick people in a hospital each week. (orphans or prisons work too)
- Create a family "swear jar" and put a dollar into it for each time you say a bad word. Then give it to charity after.
- Approach for confession.
- Reach out to and forgive someone you are disconnected with, especially family, coworkers and friends.
- Stop drinking pop, eating candy, fatty foods, and other such unhealthy treats.
- Pray morning prayers and/or evening prayers with your children. Consider reading a bible story to them at bedtime.
- Read a spiritual book.
- · Come to church for weekday services.
- Volunteer at a soup kitchen
- Donate to your favourite charities. Even adopt a child or refugee in a poorer location.
- Don't gossip. Create a "gossip jar" like the "swear jar".

Why change the candles on the Holy Table (Altar)?

- It reminds us of the presence of God at the Holy Table, just like in the one burning bush Who spoke to Abraham.
- It reminds us of the presence of God at the Holy Table, just like the Old Testament Temple which had a seven branched Menorah.
- It reminds us of the miracle of the oil after the destruction of the Temple, where the oil lamps burnt for 8 days even though there was only oil enough for 1 day. (Feast celebrated by the Jews today called "Hanukkah".)
- We can change the colour of the glass votives marking various seasons of the liturgical year.
- Cost. The tall pillar candles were very very expensive. This new set-up will save the parish some funds, and restores the tradition of our church.

What more might change with it?

- Deacon Andrij is looking into the possibility of having pure olive oil burnt in them instead of candles, to be more biblical and traditional.
- We are going to talk with the Art Committee of having the icon "The Burning Bush" painted and put on the candle stand.
