The Breath of Life: Ukrainian community celebrates a very special Pentecost By Jayne L. Buryn, Communications Coordinator, Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Edmonton June 5, 2018:

On Sunday, May 20th the Ukrainian Catholic community in the Edmonton Eparchy celebrated Zeleni Sviata (Green Holydays). Traditionally, a new day begins at 6 p.m., therefore on the evening before, Saturday, May 19th, a Divine Liturgy at St. Josaphat's Cathedral was concelebrated by Bishop David Motiuk of the Ukrainian Catholic Eparchy of Edmonton and several priests from the Eparchy and overseas. Not only did this Divine Liturgy usher in this very important feast day in the liturgical calendar, but it also launched a special celebration of the 25th anniversary of immigration to Canada of



Ukrainians from the former war-torn Yugoslavia. The celebration held special meaning for several priests in the Eparchy who themselves were immigrants from that region. The Ukrainian priests from the former Yugoslavia include Fr. Julian Bilyj, his brother Stanislav Bjeli, Frs. Slavko Dumec, Janko Herbut, Mihajlo Planchak, his son Roman Planchak and Anton Tarasenko.

"How very appropriate," noted Bishop David, in his homily, "that we celebrate the Descent of the Holy Spirit as the Breath of Life that renews the Church. "Breath equals life. No breath, no life," he pointed out. "The breath that God breathed into the disciples on Pentecost is the Holy Spirit. On Pentecost the disciples received the Holy Breath of God to bestow upon them the life and power of the new creation. "On the journey of life we are alive only because of the breath of God. Just as Jesus breathed the Holy Spirit on his disciples, so today he continues to breathe the Holy Breath of God into us today, to fill us with the life of God." Twenty-five years ago, the same Breath of Life gently touched the hearts of Canadians to sponsor the immigration to Canada of numerous Ukrainian Catholics, out of the country torn apart by ethnic strife.

The Holy Spirit, the Breath of Life ensured resources were found to draw our Ukrainian brothers and sisters into our midst. The bishop of the time, Myron Daciuk, pledged \$800,000 for sponsorship of the immigrants. About 150 families were fortunate recipients of this largesse. Included were the priests who concelebrated the Divine Liturgy, as well as Stanislav Bjeli (brother to concelebrant Julian Bilyj) who also became a priest in the Edmonton Eparchy, and several other priests and their families. Bishop David explained that we begin with a prayer to the Holy Spirit at many services or feast day celebrations in the Church, as the Holy Spirit is always with us. He presides at our baptisms, weddings, funerals, Divine Liturgies and on many other occasions.

Bishop David urged Divine Liturgy participants to pray for a renewal of the Holy Spirit's Breath of Life in our parishes and in each one of us.

Statement on the Legalization of Cannabis/Marijuana for Recreational Use

The Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops (CCCB) expresses its disappointment at the passage of Bill C-45, which legalizes cannabis/marijuana for recreational use. Given the numerous known risks cannabis use poses to human society and human health (physical, mental and emotional), it is lamentable that the federal government has decided to facilitate the provision and use of an addictive substance that will have disastrous effects for so many people.

The Canadian Medical Association, the Canadian Psychiatric Association, and the Canadian Paediatric Society have pointed out how the use of cannabis is linked to addictions, depression, anxiety, psychosis, damage to brain development, and lung problems such as asthma and emphysema. With Canadian youth considered by UNICEF as the most frequent users of marijuana in the developed world, the legalization of cannabis for recreational use will not – as the government has claimed – restrict young people's access to marijuana or diminish their use of it.

Canadian police chiefs, as well as many Indigenous, provincial and municipal leaders, continue to point out the need for additional funding to police the new legislation, and not all are convinced it is likely to reduce the involvement of organized crime but on the contrary may even have the opposite effect. Legalization is not necessary due to the difficulty of enforcement. There will always be social evils that are difficult to eradicate, but the answer surely cannot be to capitulate by condoning or legalizing them. Instead, as the Pontifical Academy for Sciences has recommended, the solutions for drug trafficking, dependency and abuse are found in educational and employment opportunities; community support for the vulnerable; treatment, prevention and medical services; family support; the curtailment of drug supply; the discouragement of drug use; and the promotion of recovery programs.

The position of the CCCB is shared by Pope Francis, who has pointed out that "the legalization, even partial, of so-called 'soft drugs' – beyond being at least questionable from the legislative point of view – does not produce the desired results" (speech to participants in the 31st International Drug Enforcement Conference, Rome, 20 June 2014). The massive increase in cannabis use that will accompany its legalization will not produce a more just and humane society, but will only exacerbate or multiply problems already widespread in society, including mental illness, crime, unemployment, family breakdown, injuries and fatalities resulting from impaired driving, and increased addiction to "harder" drugs along with associated problems resulting from overdose.

To cite the earlier CCCB statement on "Statement on Canada's Opioid Crisis and Drug Addiction," the legalization of marijuana "is potentially dangerous. The very significant health risks associated with the use of cannabis are widely recognized, particularly in young people. They include the heightened risk of heart attack, stroke, all of the respiratory and carcinogenic pathologies associated with tobacco smoke, and a multitude of psychiatric disorders, including schizophrenia. Studies have pointed to marijuana as a 'gateway drug,' underscoring the propensity of users to consume it in combination with other licit and illicit drugs, including some which may be 'harder'. At a time when so many resources are already being spent to discourage recreational tobacco use, it is difficult to comprehend the disregard for public safety entailed in legalizing marijuana, which is arguably much more dangerous."


This is a community out-reach event that feeds from 800 - 1000 people each year
