Epistle



REFLECTION

One of the features of the spiritual life, of the life of our souls, that is paradoxically both a relief and a source of anxiety, is knowing with any certainty where we are on our journey. To know the state of the health of our souls. Anxiety because unlike our physical bodies we can't see and physically examine our souls – and very few of us are so in tuned and connected with our souls as to be able to kind of mentally and emotionally assess their health. For most of us we have to look at other things that are indicators of the health of our soul – which is to say our progress in the spiritual life and journey. It is a relief however because we can know where we are by simply asking ourselves a few questions. (It goes without saying it will only be as accurate an assessment as we are honest with our answers).

As we've discussed in the previous weeks, it so often comes down to what it is we love, what it is we want. What energizes us? Where we put not only our time and energy and resources, but where we put our hope. Today I want to talk about another question we can ask ourselves that is divinely revealed in today's Gospel reading. The question is simply this: what is it we fear? Our fears can (and often do) both lead us to light, even to thee Light, but can also plunge us into the abyss of darkness. In terms of the extent of fear in our lives, it is not a question of if you are afraid, it is question of what you fear. (That is, for those of us who are not yet purified of the passions). In our reading today we have St. Matthew's account of the casting out of the demons into the heard of swine. Tellingly, in St. Mark and St. Luke's account it only mentions one man (the man possessed) known as 'Legion' who terrifies the entire area of the Gadarenes and the Gergesenes: twin cities in this region of Capernaum. Matthew's account reveals there were actually two men because he is not emphasizing the demoniac, Legion, as the others are. The emphasis here is on how the demons themselves and the townspeople respond to Christ. And their response in both cases is fear. The demons are afraid because they recognize Jesus immediately as the Messiah, God's anointed king. And as such they are well aware he has the power and authority to cast them into the abyss (probably in the ocean) from which they came. As bishop St. Nicolai Velimirovic notes, they fear this so much because they would be alone there with only themselves to hate and harm, and their great consolation of being judged and accursed 2 creatures, as we see when they possess people, is their ability to do harm to mankind: the object of God's love. It's not really so much that they fear God - if that were the case they would fall before Christ in repentance and beg His forgiveness. They don't fear God and they don't care about Him any more than they care about these people or these pigs. They fear not being able to do what it is they want to do. Sound uncomfortably familiar? It sure does to me.

So why does Christ allow them to enter the pigs, knowing as He does the demons will destroy them? Doesn't He care about these creatures? Yes, He does. We have to always keep John 1:3 in mind when we're reflecting on Jesus interacting with creation. That is, that "all things came into being Through Him (The Word of God), and apart from Him nothing has come into being that has come into being.' It's His creation. No one has, or will ever, care for it more than He. He cared about that heard of swine more than the swineherds or any of those townspeople – but the herd had a purpose to fulfill. They were to reveal to the world (of that time and all future times) what the demons would do to people, and indeed all of creation, if they could. They would kill us and they would destroy His creation because He loves it. And what of the townspeople who heard and saw all this? Did they fear the demons and be thankful they were rid of them? No, they did not. They were wary of the demon possessed men but clearly had no relief, certainly no joy, at their deliverance from this hellish bondage, because they didn't care about them. Just as they gave no thought to the demons as long as they left them alone. They weren't afraid of them and they weren't afraid of Jesus. They were afraid they'd lose more control over their lives. They were intimidated by the demon-possessed men but they had learned how to live with them by taking a route around the tombs where they were. Being Jews they must have originally hated the fact that they were a scourge to other Jews, breaking the Law of Moses by keeping the unclean swine. But they learned not to care as they learned to live with ignoring the Commandments of God - even prosper from it. They asked Jesus to leave because they had no intention of giving control of their lives to Him – exactly as the demons feared not being able to do what they wanted to do. It says in 1 John (4:18) 'perfect love casts out fear.' And the other side of this is: fear that governs our lives is ultimately protecting that which we value, which we love, most. And in these examples of self autonomy over submission to God, what is most loved, what is protected, is themselves. They fear most for themselves. Losing control over their lives, what they want to do. It's about them, about being their own god, about self devotion, self love...again, φιλουτια.

This is why the Old Testament taught them (and us), 'the beginning of wisdom is the fear of God.' It is not just fear and it is certainly not this self-protecting, self-worshipping fear. It is the fear of the power of God. They should all have fallen before Him after seeing this awesome display of power over the

demons.

Reflection.. Continued..

This is the God-centered fear of not having Him in our lives – once having experiencing Him. Because like the demons and the townspeople, God has given us the freedom to choose. 3 Do we fear giving Him our lives? Of allowing Christ to be our God instead of us being our own god? Not sure? Well, do you fear not being able to do what you want more than you fear disobeying Him? Do you fear losing control over your life more than you fear losing Him? Of letting him simply go away quietly as the Gerasenes did? Because He will you know.

He won't force you. He won't punish you for rejecting Him. If you don't want Him He'll just quietly go away. We talk about changing ourselves here a lot. That we don't come to the Church to change the Church, we come to change ourselves. In the same way we don't come to the hospital to work on the hospital but to work on ourselves. We don't come here to learn to govern ourselves, although it seems like that. Rather, we come here to learn to let God work in us and we in God. As God, Jesus didn't become man so we could become autonomous gods, but so we could be like Him and be His image Him to others and to creation. Jesus came to deliver us from the bondage of fear. From the bondage of ourselves to the blessed and sublime liberation of the bondage of His love.



Jesus arrived in a town and was met by a man who acted very strangely. He had demons. He was not in his right mind. He didn't wear clothes, and lived in the caves. When he saw Jesus, the unclean spirits made him say, "What have I to do with you, Jesus?" Jesus asked, "What is your name?" The man answered "Legion." Jesus commanded the legion, or army, of unclean spirits to leave the man and to enter the herd of pigs that were nearby. They did so, and then the herd rushed down a steep hill into the lake and all were drowned. The man was now healed. But the people of the area were afraid of Jesus, and asked that he leave. He got in the boat and left them. The man that was healed wanted to go with Jesus, but Jesus told him to return to his home, and to tell people what God had done for him.

Then the demons came out of the man and entered the pigs, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and were drowned. 
